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Introduction

At a time when the climate emergency is being felt daily across wildly varied regions of the planet with devastating and unequal consequences, 49 Cities is an exploration of visionary and utopian architectural and urban projects as seen through an ecological lens. Bringing urban form together with urban performance, the seminar hopes to open up new possibilities for architecture and the built environment today, as well as critically and imaginatively expand the discipline's 'utopian canon' to include new models from which to inspire the future.

First published in 2009, 49 Cities was conceived to move beyond purely technological approaches to sustainable design, and draw back together the possibilities for architecture and planning to work together towards projecting new forms of living. The book is a selection of 49 'seminal' visionary cities which are examined comparatively through questions of scale, density, infrastructure, typology and form as well as ratios of building to rural and natural environments, amongst other.

While certainly not exhaustive, the selection of cities constitutes an archive of Western approaches to the 'ideal city' and can be understood as an archive of archetypes which continue to be deployed across our urbanizing planet - at times with care and at others with a seeming reductionism relative to their context. It is the persistence of these models that render them interesting for us to re-examine, situating them within their broader historical context while also understanding why they might continue to be relevant (or not) for today.

As importantly, through students' class participation and final research assignments, this design seminar is intended to move beyond this 'Western utopian canon' by bringing forth historical models of cities from around the world, either in contrast to or in conversation with 49 Cities. This new selection will constitute seeds towards expanding the discipline's repertoire of visionary cities, past and future.

Structure and Assignments

Each week, the seminar will focus on a group of cities, to be understood through their graphic representation in 49 Cities. While a series of selected readings are included below as reference, the seminar is intended to support design research methods that bring a critical and designer's eye to drawings, data, images, and especially whenever possible, original material from Avery Library which students are highly encouraged to seek out. Every week, the group of cities will be presented and discussed, analyzed on their own terms as well as comparatively. Students are encouraged to broaden the discussion and render these models relevant to contemporary urbanization and the ecological crisis.

Student Presentations

All students are expected to be quite familiar with the cities presented every week, performing their own research and analysis as well as engaging with the bibliography of readings as well. Weekly presentations should situate the cities to be studied within a larger historical, political, social, and economic context, as well as, of course, within architectural, urban, and environmental contexts. Presentations should provide an in-depth and critical understanding of both the cities' representations in 49 Cities and research and readings about them. Students are asked not only to illustrate the readings through visual presentation - which should include examples of architecture, buildings, cities and environments - but also to diagram ways to understand the cities: whether extrapolating sections, axonometric or other modes of representation that build on the drawings and data in 49 Cities.

For the Final Research Assignment, students are asked to select a city – whether real or visionary – that expands and decenters the 'Western utopian canon' with alternate models absent from 49 Cities. These models should build on the questions raised in class and through the book around the possibilities of urbanism and ecology to co-exist and propose in-depth critical and imaginative analysis through a combination of architectural drawings, diagrams and text of their chosen city.

Draft of the Final Research Assignment will be presented starting the second half of the semester, to take advantage of feedback from the class. The dates for these presentations will be confirmed on the first day of class.
