On this historical site where a free black community once provided safety and a transitional safe space for those seeking freedom, the project does the same by providing transitional housing for young adults of Poughkeepsie in which it addresses the hierarchy of needs through craft and the act of making as a form of empowerment and a device of memory

The memorial is the site of Primus Martin's house, a well known member of his community. To mark significance, the site of Primus Martin's house is carved out to expose the foundations in contrast to the lifted pathways connecting to it. Through this the goal is to memorialize the individuals of the community that once lived and prospered on this site, but also represent the larger group of freedom seekers who displayed bravery and courage to breakaway from slavery. Fredonia Lane is the main through-way of the memorial calling back to its historical context as the main road for the new guinea community that preceded. A wood structure intersects coplanar with Fredonia Lane and extends outward over the landscape, stitching together the memorial and the transitional housing.



Between The Stitches focuses on making and craft as a form of empowerment and a device of memory.

The quilt was used as a symbol of resistance stitching codes within the fabric to signal the direction to safety, similar to Ashley's Sac, within just the stitching and fabric, an embedded meaning of love, care, and strength are coded within.

Objects become bearers of memory and information, like how the fragments of pottery have done at the primus martin site. However, because of the vulnerability of fabric and its ability to deteriorate, it's often the last material historians look to in order to understand the past.

The ability to be lost within history almost strengthens its ability to store memory. As the author Tiya Miles beautifully articulates " The past seems to reach out to us through these fabrics and the practices of making them that have survived over time".


Leveraging Craft

Leveraging craft studies water through the Venetian cultural practice of rowing. Individual to Venice, Voga Alla Veneta is the style of rowing in which the rowers are standing up, facing forward, and utilizing an open oarlock known as a forcola. This practice in Venice has been decreasing over time due to the difficulty of owning a wooden boat in Venice today. However, those who still honor this tradition come together for multiple regattas a year and sport their craft in competition.


The design transforms an existing pool building, established for the Nautical school on the island of San Giorgio in the 50's, into a public squero, a Venetian term for a boat repair shop. The craft of woodworking is essential to the practice of rowing. Therefore, the project tells the story of wood in Venice from extraction to creation. Visitors can watch the practice of boat making while simultaneously view the historical tools and Advanced V, Historical Preservation paintings describing the ancient practice that is used today.

The existing building showcases a reinforced concrete structure, separated from the exterior shell of the building. Tectonically, the project speaks to the existing building but establishes a new structural language of utilizing wood. It consists of a wood structure with a metal rod truss, each reacting to the different exhibit spaces while emulating the asymmetry and counterbalance of rowing the Voga Alla Veneta. Angling off of the existing building, joined by the central pond signifying a culminating moment for the project in which the exhibit speaks about the future state of the water due to climate change and how rowing today not only continues on tradition but is a tool to protest for climate awareness. It represents an ancient craft that has always demonstrated sustainable practices and was established by taking lessons from the water, not working against it.











Breathing is the basis of human life, a practice our bodies do without asking it to. Yet, it can also be consciously practiced for healing, celebration, and sound, a practice long held by South Africa's indigenous communities. Within the film, a Brother With Perfect Timing, Abdullah Ibrahim demonstrates the method of Circular Breathing, a rhythmic dance of air and soul that echoes the cadence of South Africa's journey to liberation. Breathing through jazz becomes a spiritual practice for Ibrahim during apartheid, connecting him back to the land his ancestors once freely breathed.

The qualities that define a space to breathe are not necessarily physical but instead conjure a feeling of freedom, calmness, and liberation. As Ibrahim breathes songs of liberation in the recording studio he is transported to a place of memory. How could a place to breathe like a recording booth capture sound and amplify it, reverberating the histories of places hidden?

Through the technique of pleating, iterating from the qualities of acoustic sound booths, and dying from the herbs that once grew among those of Seneca Village, this tectonic becomes a vessel to breathe life back into a site of erasure and hold knowledge of ancestral history. Ð

It seems impossible in the beat of New York City to find a place to breathe, but today many walk through Central Park for that very reason. Built in 1858, the park was described as the "Lungs of the City" by its designer Frederick Law Olmsted. The land that is now claimed for the public purpose of breathing, was home to the first and largest free black community in New York, Seneca Village. This autonomous black community thrived on the land establishing a home and a place to breathe safely. Exiled from their homes for the master plan of the park, their memory has practically been erased. The project studies the complex history public parks have established themselves on and therefore the deceptive claim that these spaces are for "all".

Harlem Lulse

Harlem Pulse is a design that is brought to life by the community and exchange of people. Its located on the boundary of Harlem and Morningside heights. This boundary has a long rooted history of divide. This space becomes a gathering space for performance events. Locating the project on the sidewalk between the neighborhoods the concave structure can go beyond just a space for performance. The sidewalk along the park is absorbed into the form extending itself onto the street and connecting the median to the park, extending the park into Harlem.

As the scale changes in the form, the single structure can be occupied differently. The structure is altered by how its used, by its electrically charged surface. Embedded within the floor are piezoelectric sensors to light up the chamber. The space becomes performative and acts as an instrument for the community.

The Savoy theatre was a venue flourishing during the Harlem Renaissance. It established itself as a safe space to be free and wild. Although it no longer exists today, its legacy vibrates through the streets of Harlem. This project aims to capture and embody this spirit, merging the public park and theatre to re imagine an interior space for wildness.










XYZSchool

The XYZ School uses the school hallway as a basis for its design. The hallway in a normative school is the heart of socialization and brings excitement throughout the monotonous school day.

To not limit these characteristics to just circulation, the hallway merges itself with the classroom. The XYZ School prioritizes movement and activity for modes of learning across the entirety of the building by extending the classroom in the x-y-z direction.

By navigating in three directions, the student's day is not stationary, instead their classes are dispersed throughout a continuous pathway where learning is not limited to just respite but also play and exploration. These classrooms are lifted up from the base of the building that holds the public programs in order to open up the ground floor. As the ground level shifts itself from above to below ground, its roof becomes the turf for a continuous open air play scape.

At XYZ School students are provided a full spectrum of learning experiences, from rest and reflection to high energy play; the mind is exercised in conjunction with the body.






The classroom works in 3 directions, X Y Z, to promote continuous movement and activity. Instead of being stagnant in one classroom for the majority of the day. The students explore and wonder to their classes passing through moments of play, study, and rest.

The school extends the park across the street through the ground floor by lifting above and leaving it open to the public.

The school functions on a different time table than typical schools; passing periods are given equal time as classes. Along the way from class to class, students experience modes of activity, connecting spaces for play and high energy, learning study spaces, and at the end points rest spaces.







Tectonics of Play

The driving concept of "tectonics of play" revolves around the idea of incorporating play directly into the construction of the design. The main wall assembly is a brick veneer system that happens across the entire facade. Breaking up the solid elevation is an operable brick screen that works in two conditions, an exterior patio, and mid door condition. The mid door condition utilizes a Nana wall set inside the operable brick screen. Therefore, on a nice day, with the Nana wall fully open, the space feels completely outdoor.

Inversely, on a rainy or cold day, with the Nana wall fully closed, it marks the building's line of enclosure. Each brick can be spun around and played with, emulating devices consistent with playgrounds, while still maintaining a protective rail across the facade. The project merges the building system across different scales to reinforce a school that prioritizes play, daylight, and fresh air.

Studying the construction ecology of this system, the project evolved into a wood screen, offering the same benefits but with deeper considerations to the buildings carbon footprint. This evolved into a half scale model that mocks up the wall assembly.

Under One Roof

Under One Roof serves as a domestic violence shelter out of necessity due to the increased cases in the Bronx. DV is also the leading cause for homelessness for women and children. Located along the Harlem River, the project utilizes the water for healing qualities for its residents. The form is established for water collection, producing an inward pitched roof. However the slope is increased to make it an inhabitable loft-like space, hosting the private, inward looking sleeping chambers. These spaces offer a small, intimate room for residents to rest and retreat.

In contrast to the solidity of the sleeping level, the descending living and community floors operate in layers of both privacy and operability. The layers of the envelope compress and expand planimetrically to create a variety of conditions both interior and exterior that respond to the natural environment and the weather. The intention here is to blur the line between inside and outside, and reconnect the residents to the natural world where the beauty of the river can be brought into the building. Through weaving and wrapping the building with these skins, they act as a connective tissue that links the building to its environment, selectively allowing in breeze, sunlight, or even misty rain.


Under One Roof reclaims the salt marsh that existed along the Harlem River before industrialization radically transformed the water's edge. The project has a duality in which it attempts to heal the river and ecosystem surrounding it, while also heal the residents from past trauma. The site in its current condition is strangled by interstates and railways. The proposed plan gives more land back to the water, and utilizes its closed off condition for privacy and protection of the residents. The most public node of the project, an immediate care clinic anchors the corner while the more private residential program splinters off into the water.
