From the very beginning, Latin America appeared to be a great unknown to the Europeans that encountered it: a land of opportunity full of possibilities and of extraordinary things. Their earliest accounts speak of a mysterious place of unbelievable cities, peoples, and landscapes. These also tell the tales of ideal lost cities of gold buried deep within the continent. These stories continued well into the 19th century with descriptions of lost civilizations and paintings depicting unbelievable sublime landscapes. Wars of independence and revolutions, in turn, began to redefine for Latin America the possibilities to establish for itself new cultural, social, and political directions.

Latin American artists, architects, and writers began to see that the territory could be the site of new societies whose innovative forms and ideals could improve the lives of its people and influence those outside. Many of these proposals resulted from and reverberated out of social upheavals (local or international), of reactions for and against modernity and its material and socio-political effects, and of searches for new organizational structures that could modify the environment through idealized orders, behaviors, and/or radical, architectural and urban forms. All in all, throughout this time, we witness the production of many proposals for natural, urban, literary, artistic, and architectural utopias intended to challenge and reconstitute society.

This research seminar will set out to study utopias/utopian communities conceived and planned throughout Latin America in the 19th and 20th centuries. We will look in depth at the different forms proposed, the manifestos of their designers, and the context that engendered them and to which they responded.

Objectives and Requirements:

This seminar will consist of an in-depth understanding and analysis of utopias in/for Latin America, their theoretization, and their polemics with the double goal of writing historical accounts and critical essays about them and of collecting and gathering information –from many available but scattered resources at Avery Library, the NYPL, and the MoMA, to name a few– in an effort to develop an accessible "archive." Given that there are no publications or other reference works that extensively address the design(s) of utopias in Latin America, the intention is to develop the foundations for a publication that will disseminate the material researched, the hypothesis studied, the knowledge produced, and the historical and/or archival information gathered. The aim of the seminar's publication proposal –not unlike a previous seminar production, *Latin America: Experiments in (Radical) Functionalism* (GSAPP Books, 2019), and Koolhaas' *Project on the City*– will be to present, polemicize, and disseminate the information produced and material gathered. As such, there

will be discussions and proposals for its graphic design and organization, the visual/graphic display of information, the graphic conventions to (re)present architectural/urban information, and the selection and organization of historical, theoretical, and critical information that will be produced for the seminar. The publication prototype will be created collectively by all of the members of the seminar.

Besides active participation in the seminar, discussion of the readings, and the presentation of examples to elucidate historical and theoretical terms and conditions, student teams will be asked to present their case studies and investigations, propose class readings, and organize a discussion format. It is expected that students will develop representational systems and organized graphic devices to present these case studies.

The order of the presentations will be established in relationship to students' deadlines, material gathered and processed, and/or other circumstances; or, if all else fails, randomly.
